Getting to school

You might start to travel to school on your own. This might be walking, getting the bus, the train or using a bike. It's good to start thinking about how you will get to school each day.

How will I get to school?

• If you're going by **bus**, CHECK:



Which bus do I need to get? What times do I catch the bus? What if I miss my bus? Will I need bus fare (money) or will I have a bus pass?



Use an alarm to make sure yo get up on time

• If you're **walking**, CHECK:



Do I know how to get there? How long will it take me? Will I walk alone or will someone walk with me? to make sure you get up on time

• If you're going by car, CHECK:



Who will take me? What time will they drop me off and pick me up? Will it be every day? What will I do if I can't go by car? Practise going to your high school before you start

Finding your way around high school

High schools can be quite big places. At first, this might feel a bit confusing but with practise, you will find it easier to find your way to your classes.

High school classrooms are often organised into **departments**. So classrooms for each subject (like English) might be located in one particular area of the school.

Look out for signs telling you where to find different departments.

You may get a plan of the school—here is an example:



Tips for finding your way around high school:

- Look at the school plan with someone
- Keep your school plan in your bag, somewhere safe like in your school planner
- When you go for school visits, see if you can use the school plan find different classrooms in the school building
- Find out where to go if you get lost—this might be the main reception

What do you need in your bag...

There are some things we might need to pack in our bag *every day* (shown inside the bag, and things we might only need *sometimes* (shown outside the bag)....

Using a timetable

You will have your own timetable for high school.

Here is an example of a high school timetable:

Your school timetable will tell you:

- The lessons you have on different days
- The start and finish times of lessons
- The teachers you have for different lessons
- The rooms you need to go to for different lessons

The school day is often split up into 'lessons' or 'periods.' Here is **Period 1** on the timetable.

- Timetables use 'Abbreviations' shortened ways of writing things.
- There are Abbreviations for Lessons and Abbreviations for Teachers.
- Here are some examples of Abbreviations: Sc = Science, $En \neq English$.
- You will need to learn what the Abbreviations mean. You could write this down in a notebook.

Room numbers sometimes are written as a letter plus a number ... like G12 or EN4. The letter might help me work out which department I need to be in ...

Here is an example of a room number: G12 = G for Geography Department + 12 for Room 2.

All about homework

- Homework gives you a chance to practise what you've been learning in school.
- Teachers will mark your homework to check your progress with learning.
- You will have deadlines for homework, so you will need to write down the date it is due in!

You will have a **homework planner** to help you organise yourself. It will tell you :

- The subjects you have homework for
- The date you need to hand in your homework
- The tasks you need to do for your homework

High schools have different rules about homework planners. Some schools have **homework clubs**—there are school staff who can give you extra help if you need it.

Here's an example of what a

REMEMBER ...

- Write your homework down when it is given
- Check you really understand what you need to do
- Use homework clubs for extra help if you need it
- Ask someone if you are stuck with your homework

Making new friends...

At high school you will be meeting new people and making new friends.

What makes a good friend?

A good friend is someone who:

- Knows you well
- You like to play with
- They usually stick up for you if someone is being mean
- Talk to you a lot at play time and lunchtime
- Share and join in with you
- Be kind
- Will help you with something that is difficult
- Good cooperation.



Here are some tips on making new friends:

- 1. Say "Hi"
- 2. Introduce yourself— tell them your name and ask them what their name is.
- 3. Say something nice to them
- 4. Ask the person a question to find out what they like, for example: "Do you support a football team?"
- 5. Ask them to join in with you
- 6. Be helpful to the person
- 7. Share with them (e.g. a pen)
- 8. Share the school rules with them





If you are lost or need help there are 'safe strangers' you can ask to help. Most strangers are probably nice people, but you can't tell by looking. That's why it's so important you don't talk to, go with or follow strangers. 'Safe strangers' are people, like your teachers or the police, who will help you if you need help.

Policemen and policewomen, fire fighters, community support officers, traffic wardens, lollypop men or ladies, postmen or someone working in a shop are all examples of safe strangers.













Bullying...

There are different ways that bullying can happen. These are just examples:

- It can be verbal (talking) like calling someone names.
- Saying things about someone that are not true.
- Repeated swearing at someone.
- Making personal comments that upset you.
- It can be physical like hitting or pushing.
 - ... and it happens a few times.

Sometimes accidents happen, or people have a joke, but this doesn't mean it's bullying. Here are some examples:

- Both people think it is funny (e.g. silly names for each other)
- Someone bumps into you and says sorry - it was just an accident.
- It was meant as a friendly joke—the other person didn't mean to hurt your feelings.

What to do if you think you are being bullied:



Telling a grown up is always the best thing to do! Don't resort to hitting and violence.

Your school will have a set of rules about bullying. This might be called a 'bullying policy'.

You can ask what your high school's policy is to deal with bullying.
